

What is foster care?

- Temporary placement for children who cannot stay at home due to abuse or neglect
- Foster parent provide a safe & nurturing temporary home
- Biological parents get support services to help their child come home safely

What is the MO C.A.R.E. Program?

MO - Missouri C - Caregiver A - and **R** - Resource E - Education

MO CARE is the required training and content adapted from the National Training and Development Curriculum (NTDC) for foster and adoptive parents. This training includes 10 sessions, 3 hours each, that focus on trauma, the child welfare system, child development, attachment, communication, and parenting.

These training sessions also offer an opportunity for prospective families to:

- Ask questions
- Build relationship staff
- Determine if foste choice

• Build relationships with other parents and agency

• Determine if foster or adoptive parenting is the right

Do I have to take in every child?

The assessment and licensing process is ongoing, and enables agencies to place children based on:

- Your specific parenting skills
- The capacity of your home
- The information you provide
- The child's unique needs

Even if your home is selected for a foster child, you always have the option to decline the placement.



What type of support is available?

You will be assigned a Children's Division team member who will support and guide you in:

- Finding and completing the required training
- Learning more about support and respite care



What type of support is available?

Foster parents also receive:

- A monthly maintenance payment to help cover the costs of care
- Healthcare coverage through Missouri Medicaid for the child's medical, psychological, and dental needs
- Help paying for child care services if they work or go to school full time
