

Missouri Department of SOCIAL SERVICES Your Potential. Our Support. U.S. Congressional passage of the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) of 1978 sets out requirements and procedures regarding Indian children including the following:

- Protective custody
- Out-of-home care placements
- Pre-adoptive and adoptive placements
- Voluntary relinquishments
- Actions to terminate parental rights
- Actions related to status offenses

Will the ICWA Apply?



If you believe that ICWA applies to your family or if you have questions, please contact your case manager or local Children's Division Office.

Services may be provided:

- Jointly and in a responsive manner to the child and family's Indian heritage and culture.
- Indian social services may provide all the services needed by the child and family.

Where Indian child welfare services are available, either through the tribe or an Indian center, Division staff is responsible for cooperating and coordinating all out-ofhome care services with these social service resources.
