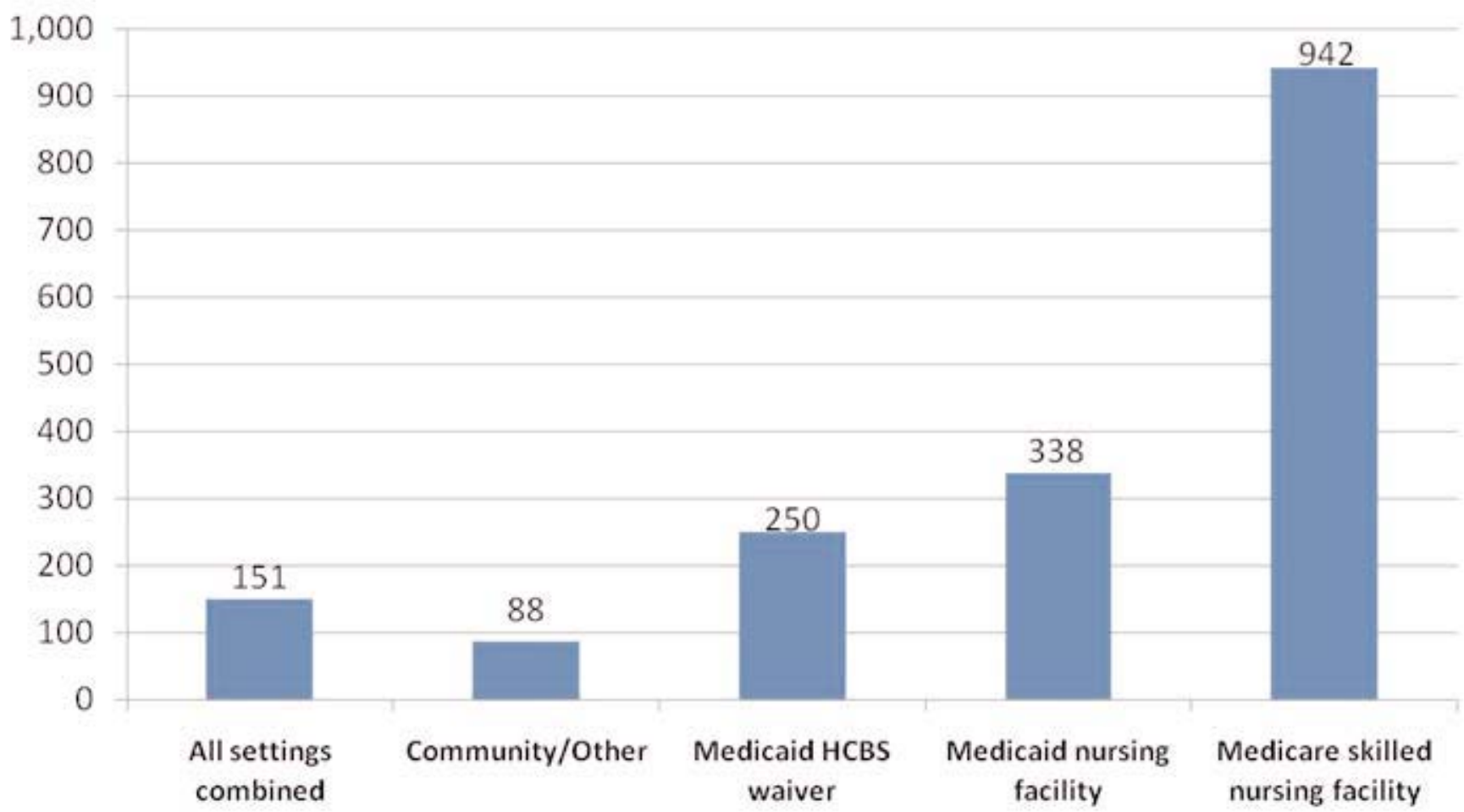
Background

- CMS Estimates 25% of Hospitalizations for Dual Eligible Participants are Potentially Avoidable
- Representing 20% of Medicare Inpatient Spend
- Significant Variability by Location and by State

- Congestive Heart Failure most Common Diagnosis Overall, Pneumonia for Skilled Nursing Facilities
- Active Intervention(s) to Reduce Frequency of Potentially Avoidable Hospitalizations (PAH) in Nursing Facilities a Focus for CMS and for States

CMS Initiative Announcement

- “Qualified Agencies or Organizations” Open to Apply, Supported by DSS and DHSS
- The Model - Onsite Activist Care and Coordination Providers Working in Cooperation with Current Staff
- Working to Implement “Preventive Services”
- Facilitate Transitions to and from Inpatient Care
- Will Coordinate and Improve Management and Monitoring of Prescription Drugs

Further Details

- Timeframe August 25, 2012 - August 24, 2016
- Nationally \$128 million Funding Opportunity
- Approximately Seven Awards Anticipated, Ranging from \$5 million to \$30 million each
- Each Awarded Organization will enter into Cooperative Agreement with at least Fifteen Medicare- and Medicaid-certified Nursing Facilities to Implement its Intervention

Key Dates

- Intent to Apply: due to CMS by April 30, 2012
- Full application: due to CMS by June 14, 2012, including Letters of Support from DSS and DHSS
- Anticipated Notice of Award: August 24, 2012
- Cooperative Agreement Period of Performance: August 25, 2012 - August 24, 2016
