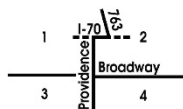

ST. LOUIS — Historical society unites donors of breach. The Missouri Historical Society notified donors Monday that personal information such as their names, addresses and dates of birth may have been compromised as part of a data breach.

The breach occurred in May, MHS officials said in a statement, and they were notified in mid-July by a third party. Blackbaud, that handles fundraising, payment services and other responsibilities, MHS was notified of several suspicious organizations to be impacted.

No personal financial information was stolen because it was encrypted, MHS officials said.

Cybercriminals were able to remove a copy of a subset of data from Blackbaud's self-hosted environment before being traced from the network," the statement said. "Blackbaud asserts that the attackers were not able to fully deploy ransomware and encrypt or back up its systems, but a ransom was still paid."

Officials said that as far as they can tell, all the information that was accessed has been destroyed and there is "currently no evidence" of the information being used. Still, they cautioned donors to "be wary of unknown phone calls and potential email scams."

"We respect the privacy of our members and donors and held sacred the trust given to us when donations are made to our institution," the statement said. "It is our policy to never share or sell our donor information to another institution for any reason. For this reason, the blackbaud self-hosted data breach is very troubling to us."

LAW AND ORDER

ST. LOUIS — Woman killed, 3 injured in shooting. A quadruple shooting early Tuesday in north St. Louis left a woman dead and three other people hospitalized.

The shooting happened about 12:45 a.m. near Simple Avenue and Fletcher Boulevard.

The four people, all in their 20s, were shot in a vehicle, police said. The woman died at the scene. Two men were stable and a fourth victim was in critical condition, authorities said.

Police didn't release any more details about the shooting.

The scene was on the border of the Mark Twain and the Walnut Park East neighborhoods. The Walnut Park East neighborhood has already seen nine homicides this year and is the focus of an anti-violence campaign that began last week.

St. Louis has had at least 157 homicides this year, compared with 114 during the same time last year.

ST. CHARLES — Man admits to providing fatal drug dose, prosecutors say. A man from Wright City has admitted selling a dose of fentanyl that killed someone Tuesday, the U.S. attorney's office said.

Leota A. Craig, 43, was charged by complaint in U.S. District Court in St. Louis on Tuesday with distribution of fentanyl.

The investigation began after two men passed out to a car Sunday morning. The car rolled down St. Charles street and into someone's yard, charging documents say. Police and medical personnel were only able to revive one of the men, who later told investigators that the pair bought what they thought was cocaine from someone at the casino. Police found surveillance video showing Craig selling something to two men, charging documents say, and an undercover officer then bought 1400 worth of fentanyl from Craig.

After police arrested Craig, he said he sold fake fentanyl to the officer, charging documents say. He said he met the men at the casino elevator and admitted selling them fentanyl, but said he told them what it was and that it was not cocaine, the charges say.

No lawyer is yet listed for Craig.

CLAYTON COUNTY — Metro East man drowns in Huzzah Creek. A Highland man drowned Saturday in Huzzah Creek in Clayton County, according to the Missouri Highway Patrol.

Dillon Newkirk, 24, began to struggle in the water and did not resurface about 5:30 p.m. Saturday near that's popular for float trips and kayakers.

His body was recovered from the water by family, according to the patrol.

Newkirk grew up in Breese, in Clinton County, and was working at Scott Air Force Base as a contractor at the time of his death, according to his obituary.

He earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville.

Newkirk is survived by his parents, two siblings and a fiancée, who he was set to marry in October, the obituary said.

ST. LOUIS — Iowa woman killed on I-44. A woman who was hit and killed on Interstate 44 near Memorial Drive was identified Tuesday as an Iowa resident, police said.

Jude Wold, 65, of Norwalk, Iowa, was pronounced dead at a hospital.

A 21-year-old woman who had come to Wold's car to check on her was listed in critical condition.

Wold was stopped in a 2018 Toyota RAV4 about 11 p.m. Monday when the 21-year-old woman got out of her car to talk to Wold. Wold exited her car before a 2007 Chevrolet Silverado 1500 driven by a 55-year-old man hit the Toyota and both women.

The driver of the Chevrolet stayed at the scene. It wasn't clear why Wold's car was stopped on the interstate. The investigation is ongoing.

ST. LOUIS — Man dies after tractor-trailer overturns at weigh station. A Bellevue, Missouri, man is dead after his tractor-trailer overturned Monday morning at a weigh station in north St. Louis.

Clinton Percy, 56, overturned a 2012 Deere tractor-trailer just after 9 a.m. Monday at Adams Grain, East Grand Avenue.

Preliminary investigations indicate Percy's truck was traveling on a service road leading to the weigh station when his truck left the roadway, went down an embankment and turned over onto the driver's side, police said.

When officers arrived, Percy was trapped inside the trailer. Percy was taken to a hospital, where he was later pronounced dead.

Tropical Storm Isaias creates havoc

East Coast sees floods, tornadoes, high winds; at least 4 people killed

WINDSOR, N.C. — At least four people were killed as Tropical Storm Isaias spawned tornadoes and dumped rain Tuesday along the East Coast after making landfall as a hurricane in North Carolina, where it caused floods and fires that displaced dozens of people.

Two people died when Isaias spun off a tornado that struck a North Carolina mobile home park. Authorities said two others were killed by falling trees toppled by the storm in Maryland and New York City.

More than 18 hours after coming ashore, Isaias still had sustained top winds of 65 mph. As of Tuesday evening, the storm's center was about 20 miles west of Albany, New York.

As Isaias sped northward at 40 mph, the National Hurricane Center warned of flash flood threats in the New York's Hudson River Valley and potential for minor to moderate river flooding elsewhere in the mid-Atlantic region.

Two people died after a tornado demolished several mobile homes in Windsor, North Carolina. Emergency responders finished searching the wreckage Tuesday afternoon. They found no other casualties, and several people initially feared missing had all been accounted for, said Ron Wesson, chairman of the Bertie County Board of Commissioners. He said about 12 people were hospitalized.

Sharee and Jeffrey Stillwell took shelter in their living room about 1:20 a.m. Tuesday as the tornado tore through Windsor. Sharee Stillwell said their home shook "like a freight train."

"It felt like the house was going to cave in," said Jeffrey Stillwell, 65, though once the storm passed, the couple found only a few damaged shingles and fallen tree branches in the yard.

The mobile home park less than 2 miles away wasn't so fortunate. Aerial video by WRAL-TV showed fields of debris where rescue workers in brightly colored suits picked through splintered boards and other wreckage. Nearby, a vehicle was flipped onto its roof.

"It doesn't look real. It looks like something on TV. Nothing is there," Ber-

County Sheriff John Holley told reporters, saying 10 mobile homes had been destroyed. "All my officers are down there at this time. Pretty much the entire trailer park is gone."

In New York City, a massive tree fell and crushed a van in the Briarwood section of Queens, killing a man inside, police said. A woman in Mechanicsville, Maryland, died when a tree crashed onto her car during stormy conditions, said Cpt. Julie Yingling of the St. Mary's County sheriff's office.

Isaias toggled between hurricane and tropical storm strength as it churned toward the East Coast. Fueled by warm ocean waters, the storm got a late burst of strength as a rejuvenated hurricane with top sustained winds of 105 mph before coming ashore late Monday near Ocean Isle Beach, North Carolina.

Many homes flooded in Ocean Isle Beach, and at least five caught fire, Mayor Debbie Smith told WRCT-TV.

Before making landfall late Monday, Isaias killed two people in the Caribbean and battered the Bahamas before brushing past Florida. On Tuesday, forecasters expected it to remain a tropical storm on a path into New England.

"We don't think there is going to be a whole lot of weakening. We still think there's going to be very strong and gusty winds that will affect much of the mid-Atlantic and the Northeast over the next day or two," hurricane specialist Robbie Beggs told The Associated Press.

Tornadoes were confirmed by the National Weather Service in Virginia, Maryland, Delaware and New Jersey. Power outages also spread as trees fell, with more than 1.2 million customers losing electricity, most of them in New Jersey, North Carolina and Virginia, according to PowerOutage.US, which tracks utility reports.

In Doylestown, Pennsylvania, officials said four children were treated for minor injuries after high winds partially tore the roof off a day care center. Also in the Philadelphia suburbs, rescue workers in Delaware County were searching for a young person who fell or jumped into the fast-moving water of a swollen creek, said Timothy Boyce, the county emergency services director.

In New York City, fierce wind and rain forced the Staten Island ferry and outdoor subway lines to shut down. The New Jersey Turnpike banned car-pulled trailers and motorcycles.

Some of the worst damage Tuesday seemed to be east and north of where the hurricane's eye struck land in North Carolina.

"Fortunately, this storm was fast-moving and has already left our state," Gov. Roy Cooper said Tuesday.

In North Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, the storm sent waves crashing over the Sea Cabin Pier late Monday, causing a big section to collapse into the water as startled bystanders taking photos from the pier scrambled back to land.

"It's shocked it's still standing," said Dean Burris, who watched from the balcony. Elison and David Hubler were out early Tuesday cleaning up in North Myrtle Beach, where a few feet of storm surge flooded cars, unheeled docks and etched a water line into the side of their home.

"When the water started coming, it didn't stop," Elison Hubler said. They had moved most items of value to their second floor, but a mattress and washing machine were unexpected storm casualties.

"We keep thinking we've learned our lesson," she said. "And each time there's a hurricane, we learn a new lesson."

According to the statement, Webster County Sheriff's Office deputies interviewed Lester on Sunday and he initially denied inappropriately touching the children and then said he might have touched one of the children's breasts while roughhousing.

The statement says the child victims in this case were taken into protective custody.

Statutory sodomy carries a possible life sentence in Missouri. The child molestation charges are punishable by up to 15 years in prison. Lester does not have an attorney listed for this case.
